Program Description & Objectives

This program will be of interest to pediatric and adolescent primary care providers who are interested in expanding their knowledge in a variety of subspecialty areas with new or updated guidelines or practice parameters that impact primary pediatric care. In particular, healthcare providers who do not feel comfortable in recognizing or managing patients with the above conditions will benefit from this conference.

The subspecialty topics covered in the conference deal with conditions that generally involve a team approach for patient care, including the primary care physician and the subspecialist. The conference will provide the primary care physician with practical information that will help them to become more knowledgeable in identifying, understanding, and co-managing a variety of complex conditions along with the subspecialist. The conference will also provide an opportunity for the primary care physicians to ask questions directly to the participating subspecialists to further enhance their understanding of the conditions discussed. The combination of didactic and interactive elements will promote a more effective learning experience.

At the conclusion of this activity, participants will be better able to:

- Gain a better understanding of celiac serologies/genetic testing and their use
- Discuss the landscape for potential non-dietary therapies
- Review etiology and management of neurogenic bladder and conditions associated with voiding dysfunction
- Develop an approach to the evaluation of and management strategies for acne
- Recognize that children playing more hours of sports per week than their chronologic age are at risk for overuse injuries
- Recognize that younger athletes are tearing their ACLs, and that the graft choice for the reconstruction depends on the bone and developmental age of the child
- Identify precocious puberty in boys and girls and to know when a referral to a pediatric endocrinologist is appropriate
- Discuss the antibiotic management for common pediatric head, eyes, ears, nose and throat infections
- Apply the latest guidelines for the evaluation and management of pediatric obesity
- Identify life-threatening causes of chest pain in children that require referral to the emergency department
- Recognize and manage common disorders that cause abnormal uterine bleeding
- Identify specific follow-up needs for high-risk neonates, including qualifying criteria, hearing and vision screening, nutritional needs and infection prevention
- Describe the symptoms and classification of primary immunodeficiencies and primary immune regulatory disorders
- Apply behavioral, psychological, and psychopharmacological interventions to treat anxiety disorders in the primary care setting
- Identify common co-morbidities of Autism Spectrum Disorder
- Describe important updates in the 2021 STI Treatment Guidelines
